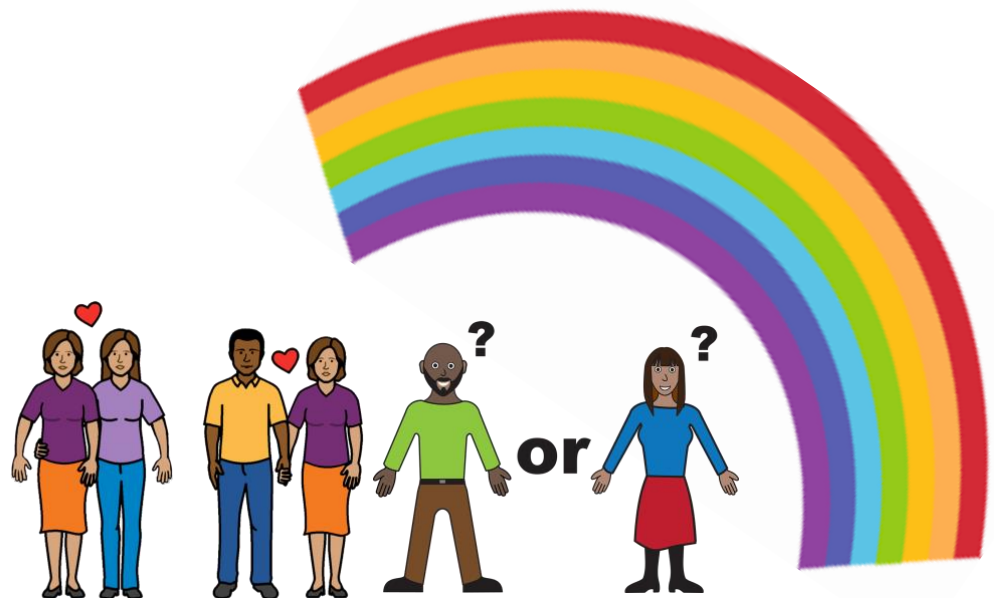

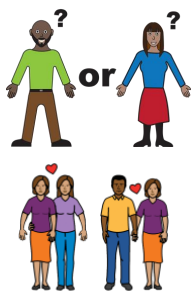

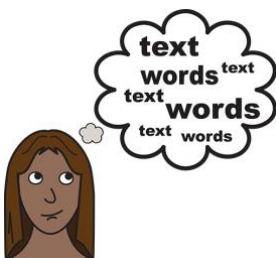
What is LGBTIQA+?

LGBTIQA+ are letters that mean

- lesbian
- gay
- bisexual
- transgender
- intersex
- queer
- asexual
- other.



LGBTIQA+ also means **diverse sexes,**
sexualities and genders



You can **learn** about these words in **this book.**



Sex

Can mean when you have sex with someone.

But it is also about the body you are born with.

The body you are born with is usually seen as



• **male**



• **female**

or



• **intersex**

• Intersex can be

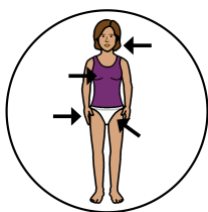
- neither **male nor female**
- both **male and female**
- in between male and female.



Assigned Sex

When people are young they are usually told they are male female or intersex.

The sex people are given is usually based on



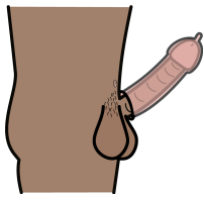
- **Private body parts.**

These are also called genitals.

and



- **hormones.** These are chemicals inside peoples body that are said to be male or female.

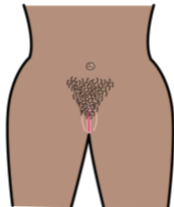


People who are told they are male usually have

- **penis**
- **testicles** or balls



- higher amounts of the hormone testosterone

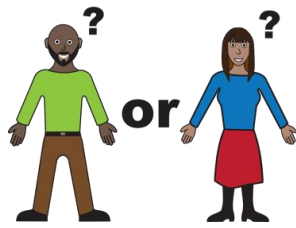


Female bodies usually have

- a **vagina**
- a **vulva**



- higher amounts of the hormones
 - estrogen and
 - progesterone.

Gender is not the same as sex. It is about how you see yourself or how you identify.

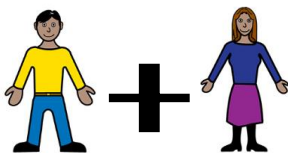
Like you can see yourself as



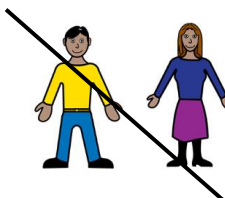
- a woman



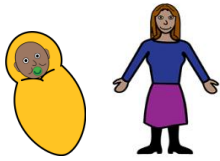
- a man



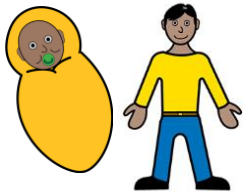
- between a woman and a man



- not a woman or a man

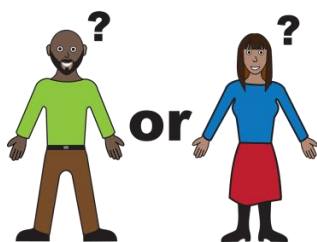


People who are women are usually born with female private parts. This is called being **assigned female at birth**.

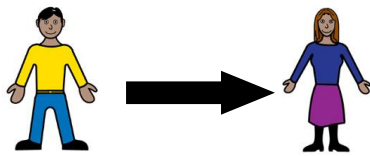


People who are men are usually born with male private parts.

This is called being **assigned male at birth**.



But this is not **always** the case!



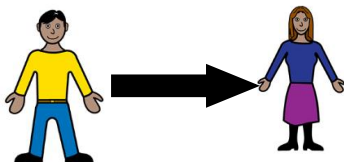
Transgender



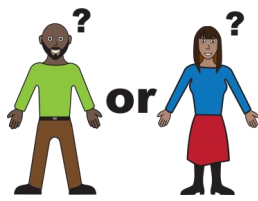
Some people who are **assigned male at birth** are **women**.



Some people who are **assigned female at birth** are **men**.



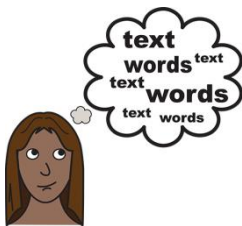
These people have usually changed their gender.
This is called **transgender**.



You can let other people know their **gender** with things like



- your name



- words you use about yourself. Like

- he and him
- she and her

or

- they and them.



These words are called **pronouns**.

Sexuality is about the people you love or have romantic feelings for. You can love



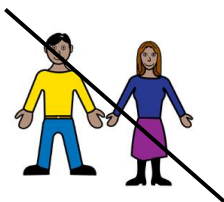
- women



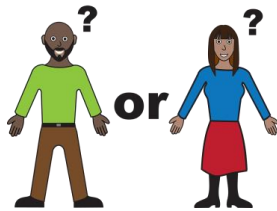
- men



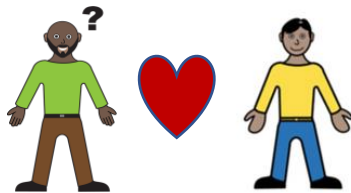
- all genders



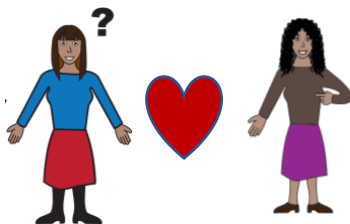
- no one.



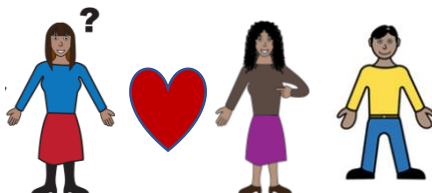
You may hear people use different words for **sexuality** based on gender. Like



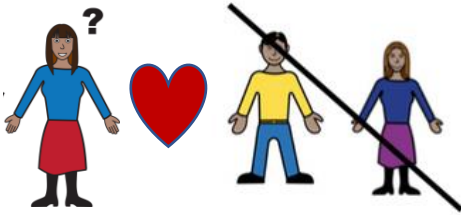
A man that loves a man can be called **gay** or **homosexual**.



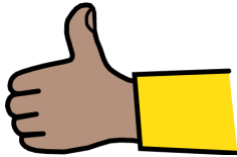
A woman that loves a woman can be called **lesbian** or **homosexual**.



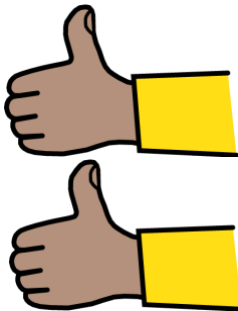
A person that loves people of more than one gender can be called **bi-sexual**.



Some people do **not** have any sexual feelings for anyone. This is called **Asexual**.



This is **ok!**

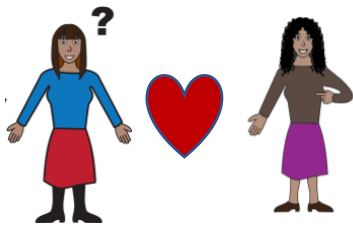


All sexualities and genders are ok!



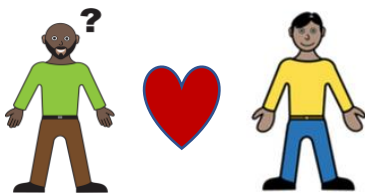
LGBTIQA+ Words

LGBTIQA+ means diverse sexualities and genders. The letters in **LGBTIQA+** stand for **Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex, Queer, Questioning, Asexual and other**. We explain these words below.



Lesbian

A woman who has romantic feelings for other women.



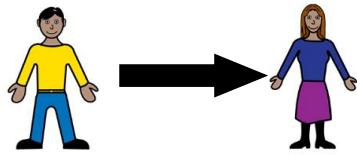
Gay

A man who has romantic feelings for other men.



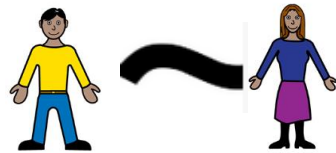
Bisexual

A person who has romantic feelings for more than one gender.



Transgender

A person who's gender does not match the sex they were given at birth.



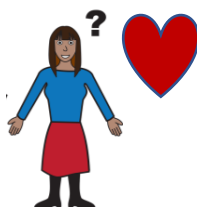
Intersex

A person whose body is not **male** or **female**.



Queer

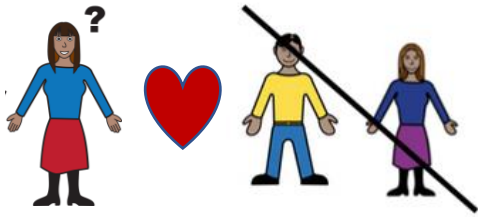
Another word used to talk about the LGBTQIA+ community.



Questioning

A person who is

- not sure or
- trying to work out their sexuality or gender.



Asexual

A person that does **not** have any sexual feelings for other people.
